He was killed by Indian agency police on the Standing Rock Indian Reservation during an attempt to arrest him, at a time when authorities feared that he would join the ...

He is remembered for his lifelong distrust of white men and his stubborn determination to resist their domination.

Sitting Bull, named Jumping Badger as a child, was born into a prominent Hunkpapa Lakota family between the years of 1831-1837, near the confluence of the Grand and Missouri Rivers in present day South Dakota, or perhaps along the Yellowstone River.
